#### I. Program Description:

Recognizing that the economy of Mississippi depends in large measure upon the development and wise use of natural resources in the state, the Mississippi Legislature established the Forest and Wildlife Research Center (FWRC) in 1994. Since its establishment, scientists in the FWRC have worked towards the goal of creating a sustainable natural resource environment in Mississippi. The FWRC provides the only research program in Mississippi focused on managing and utilizing the forest, wildlife, fisheries, and water resources while protecting and enhancing the natural environment associated with these resources. The FWRC supports research that encourages the growth and development of the forest products manufacturing industries, including furniture. Natural resources provide opportunities for the state's citizens in recreation and jobs, and create over \$21.9 billion in economic impact to the state.

#### II. Program Objective:

Production of renewable energy provides numerous opportunities for the state of Mississippi, especially with the construction of Kior in Columbus and Natchez. Scientists in the FWRC have already begun assisting Kior in the development of biofuels. FWRC scientists are pioneers in the use of woody materials to create bio-oil and have discovered a method to hydro-treat bio-oil to a hydrocarbon fuel. This upgraded biofuel can be blended with gasoline and diesel fuels or transported to a petroleum refinery to be turned into gasoline or diesel fuel.

Recent research in the FWRC has found over 3.5 million dry tons of logging residues and un-harvested first thinning-sized materials available each year for bio-fuel raw material. This is coupled with the growing timber which covers nearly two-thirds of the state. To determine where the resources are available, FWRC scientists have developed a software program which uses satellite imagery and ground analysis to determine the exact economically-feasible location to place a plant or mill with the closest access to raw materials. Kior used the software when deciding where to place their plants.

The software, which is used by the Mississippi Forestry Commission's Forest Inventory Institute, allows scientists to keep track of forest inventory and monitor changes over time in the state's natural resources. As climate change begins to impact forest ecosystems and wildlife, changes will occur within the landscape. While these changes may be subtle, it is important for scientists to monitor the changes over time. A periodic inventory of forest resources will inform adaptation strategies and allow the state to utilize natural resources in a sustainable manner. As changes occur, scientists will be poised to provide solutions to ensure the continued availability of natural resources.

Scientists are also developing new and unique ways to utilize timber resources. While biofuels is an important contribution to our state and will utilize our resources, other avenues are being explored. One project has found a way to turn wood into magnetic charcoal and other carbon-based products with higher absorption capacity. Magnetic charcoal is efficient in cleaning environmentally hazardous chemicals and may provide a new market for the forest industry. Antiradiation materials are also being created to combat a nuclear accident or detoxification materials to assist in environmental cleanup. Scientists are also using naturally woody fibers to create a specialty fiber-polymer composite to use in automobiles. The fibers can be formed into sheets or compressed into a mold. These technologies are being discovered to provide new markets for our natural resources and provide economic opportunities for rural communities.

The rural nature of Mississippi provides unlimited opportunities for landowners to diversify their income through natural resource enterprises. FWRC scientists teach families how to turn their lands into enterprises for recreational uses. With urban sprawl throughout the nation, it is often hard for city dwellers to find a place to hunt, fish, watch wildlife, or just sit and listen to the crickets on the bank of a farm pond. Mississippians have an opportunity to develop their lands as an escape from the city for many individuals. These recreational uses not only help families and rural communities achieve financial stability, they also increase property values. A recent study by FWRC scientists found that recreational uses increased land prices by an average of \$654 per acre or 52 percent of the property value.

FWRC scientists are continuously working to understand the habitat and needs of Mississippi wildlife and fisheries, which provide much to the quality of life within the state. Hunting, fishing and wildlife watching activities contribute \$2.7 billion to the state's economy. As the research arm of the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, FWRC scientists monitor the state's wildlife and fisheries populations. As issues arise, scientists offer solutions to sustain populations or in some cases, scientists recommend changes in hunting to deter some

invasive species. The goal of FWRC scientists is to manage wildlife and fishery resources for the betterment of the state, region, and nation.

The Forest and Wildlife Research Center provides scientifically-based solutions to many of the economic and environmental issues facing our state. The solutions are found in the research conducted by scientists and graduate students. Graduate education is an important component of the research program. With the retirement of many in natural resource fields, the training of future leaders to manage, conserve and sustain forest, wildlife, fisheries, and water resources is essential.

#### FWRC Research Impacts Affects All Mississippians

Industry - Forest and Wildlife Research Center scientists devised a dual system treatment for railroad ties to extend their service life from 7 years to 25 years. Today nearly a million ties are dual-treated and installed annually by Class 1 railroads saving the industry millions of dollars. There are more than 400 million crossties in use, with an estimated 23 million replaced each year. A separate study has looked at trends in the logging industry over the last 10 years. Timber has become one of Mississippi's most valuable crops. In 2010, the market value at the point of first processing was \$1.08 billion. Logging firms are an important component in moving the timber from the woods to the mills. Logging firms employed 6,427 individuals and paid \$133 million in wages. By monitoring the effects of changes in the wood supply system, scientists are developing management tools for the wood supply system that will maximize revenue and reduce costs.

Producers-About 15,000 acres of catfish ponds were retired in 2009, and more are expected to be retired. To help farmers compensate for this lost revenue, scientists in the Forest and Wildlife Research Center are helping farmers develop these ponds into Natural Resource Enterprises for fee-fishing. Over 534,000 individuals fish each year in Mississippi, spending \$239 million on trip-related expenses. Producers are also struggling with wild pigs which wreak havoc across the south, causing major crop and environmental damage. It is estimated that wild pigs are costing the U.S. about \$1.2 billion a year. Research by scientists in the FWRC is helping landowners to determine where and how to best control this feral swine. Scientists, along with personnel in Extension and USDA APHIS, are now helping farmers and landowners across the state by offering workshops on wild pig trapping.

Supervisors - Personnel in the Franklin Furniture Institute, a unit of the Forest and Wildlife Research Center, have designed specialized training for first-line supervisors-those responsible for managing workers and coordinating all of the activities to make, ship, sell and deliver thousands of pieces of furniture. In Mississippi, the furniture industry employs some 24,000 workers and pays \$959 million in wages.

Landowners - Scientists in the FWRC has recently discovered how cottonwood trees begin to produce seasonal flower buds. The development may help accelerate domestication of these trees for biomass and other products. Cottonwood trees are increasingly grown in plantations as economically important, fast-growing woody crops for bioenergy wood, fiber and carbon storage. The study could provide an additional crop for the 125,000 forest landowners who own the majority of the state's timber resources. Scientists are also studying the best genetically-suited tree to grow in poorly drained, heavy clay soils where catfish farms once resided and which are not suitable for agricultural purposes.

Homeowners - Homeowners spend \$5 billion annually replacing deteriorated wood. Scientists in the Forest and Wildlife Research Center have developed a nondestructive test method to measure the loss of mass and compression strength without harming the wood product, saving homeowners time and replacement cost. Scientists have also developed new wood preservatives that are both environmentally benign and effective at preventing wood decay.

Recreationalist - White-tailed deer hunting generates over a billion dollars in economic activity each year in the state. Research in the Forest and Wildlife Research Center has found that protecting young bucks improves herd health and creates a better hunting experience. The study found that protecting young bucks is important because they father nearly a third of all fawns. Protecting younger bucks not only improves the health of the deer population but also improves the buck-to-doe ratio, which shortens the breeding season. A new study is tracking wild deer to determine antler size and growth rates. Understanding antler development under field conditions helps provide a scientific basis for setting hunting regulations, especially related to antler restrictions and harvest rates for younger bucks.

With over 19.6 million acres of forest land, Mississippi is poised to be a leader in bioenergy. Mississippi has over 3.5 million dry tons of logging residues and un-harvested first thinning-sized materials available each year for bio-fuel raw material.

FWRC scientists are also leaders in forest inventory and monitoring and have developed an inventory program unmatched in the region.

Funds are needed to expand the energy and inventory research areas. Additional funds will allow the FWRC to hire two assistant professors and two graduate students.

These newly hired professors will also teach students in curricula specifically designed to train students in these emerging technologies.

#### (E) Capacity Funds:

Capacity Funds \$ 61,560

Capacity funds will allow the FWRC to promote strategic investment through state appropriations to fund graduate research and will enable the FWRC to address critical forest and wildlife related needs of the state and to create a future pool of experts needed to address needs impacting our state, region and country.

Capacity funds will allow the FWRC to reinforce its core operational needs. The MSU Forest & Wildlife Research Center requests additional funding to offset the increased costs of its operations. Funding to replace aged equipment will enable the FWRC to be competitive in the research arena.

Capacity funds will allow a scheduled, routine maintenance for FWRC facilities that have previously gone without consistent upkeep due to lack of funding. Repair and renovation of buildings will enhance safety of workers and bring buildings in compliance with the American Disability Act (ADA) and fire safety standards.
