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FEDERAL FUNDS

The U. S. Department of Health & Human Services/Office of Inspector General has awarded funds to the Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit. The Unit was established to investigate and prosecute fraud committed by providers of medical services to Medicaid recipients. The Unit also investigates reports of abuse/neglect/exploitation of adult residents/patients in Mississippi health care facilities. The Medicaid Fraud grant award requires a 25% match.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded a continuation grant to the Attorney General's Cyber Crime Division to establish and operate an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The ICAC Task Force is the umbrella agency for the State of Mississippi for enforcement, investigation, and prosecution of Internet Crimes Against Children. The Task Force is the central training facility for ICAC investigative standards, forensic analysis, and prosecution and provides on-site and in-the-field technical assistance for agencies involved in ICAC cases. The Task Force provides leadership for proactive and reactive investigations and extends outreach into law enforcement, the community, and educational system for prevention and intervention of internet or technological exploitation of children.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded grant funds to the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division to establish and operate an Intellectual Property (IP) program. The program is geared towards improving the state's capacity to address criminal intellectual property enforcement. The program has been named Operation Knock Out Knock-Offs ("Operation KOKO"). The objectives will be to establish and oversee a statewide task force of federal, state, and local authorities; increase the knowledge of local authorities on IP enforcement through intensive statewide and regional training; assist local authorities in enforcing IP laws through investigatory, technical, and prosecutorial assistance; and, focus on counterfeit goods which implicate safety concerns. Operation KOKO will be instrumental in making Mississippi a safer, healthier place to live by reducing the number of IP crimes in the state while educating merchants and the general public about the safety issues and dangers associated with counterfeit goods.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded grant funds to the Attorney General's Prosecutor Training Division to assist public servants in the repayment of student loans. One hundred percent of this funding will be awarded to prosecutors and public defenders who qualify for loan assistance.

The U. S. Department of Justice and the Mississippi Department of Public Safety Planning have awarded funds to the Attorney General's Crime Victim Compensation Divsion. The Department of Justice grant is a Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Compensation grant for victims' payments, of which five percent can be used for administration to enhance and expand the program. The administration portion includes support for executive and clerical staff to manage case loads, ensure that eligibility requirements are met, and process compensation payments. The Department of Public Safety sub-grant is a VOCA Victim Assistance grant which can only be used to provide direct assistance to victims. This assistance includes advocacy and support for victims of all crime types, funding for victims of violent crime, e.g., out-of-pocket court related expenses, repair and replacement costs for home or vehicle damage, and crime scene cleanup. The Public Safety Victim Assistance grant requires a 20% match.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds to the Attorney General's Cyber Crime Internet Crimes Against Children Unit to create a new position to prosecute crimes against children, provide additional training and education in the area of public safety, maintain services to the State of Mississippi in the forensic examination of media in child cases, and maintain/create partnerships in the state to work with associates as a team in fighting crimes against children. This program will be concluded in FY 2014.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds to the Attorney General's Prosecutor Training Division to create a Rural Law Enforcement Task Force. The mission of the Task Force is to develop guidelines and procedures to assist the rural law enforcement community in quickly and efficiently sharing intelligence information in ongoing criminal investigations. The grant award enabled the Office to create an attorney/prosecutor position to provide assistance to rural law enforcement agencies through individual case/report review, technical assistance, and training. The grant also created a projects officer position to oversee all aspects of

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data collection and submission and to assist the attorney/prosecutor as needed. This program was concluded in FY 2013.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Mississippi State University, Computer Security Division, to receive Federal pass through funds from the National Science Foundation to cover a portion of the operating costs of the Cyber Crime Fusion Center. The Cyber Crime Fusion Center is providing Mississippi with a comprehensive investigative agency equipped to analyze and examine electronic evidence associated with Internet criminal activities. The Center investigates and assists other agencies with the investigation of complex electronic crimes, prosecutes and assists in the prosecution of crimes, trains law enforcement investigators and prosecutors, provides electronic evidence recovery services, distributes accurate information to the public, works to identify electronic criminals, and strives to prevent future crimes and the exploitation of our young people. This funding was concluded in FY 2013.

The U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has awarded funds to the Attorney General's Tobacco and Alcohol Enforcement Division for the purpose of carrying out inspections of entities and retail establishments that sell or advertise cigarettes and/or smokeless tobacco products to determine whether those entities are complying with the Tobacco Control Act. FDA has been granted authority to regulate the manufacture, marketing, and distribution of tobacco products to protect the public health generally and to reduce tobacco use by minors. The award will enable the Attorney General's Office to assist FDA in any enforcement or judicial actions, including coordinating the drafting and execution of declarations by the officers and minors who participated in inspections, and arranging for their testimony, if necessary, and furnishing evidence.

The Mississippi Department of Public Safety Planning has awarded funds to the Attorney General's Domestic Violence Unit to support programs that will improve the quality and efficiency of domestic violence and sexual assault prosecutions, thus increasing the conviction rate of those offenses. The Public Safety Domestic Violence grant requires a 25% match.

Federal sub-grant funds were received from the Department of Public Safety to improve the quality of DUI prosecutions, thus increasing the conviction rate for those offenses. The impaired driver is the primary contributing factor in fatal traffic crashes every year. Although speeding and other aggressive driving behaviors cause deadly crashes too, alcohol remains the predominant enemy of traffic safety. When DUI arrests decrease, there are corresponding increases in traffic fatalities. The Public Safety DUI grant requires a 20% match.

Federal Juvenile Justice sub-grant funds were received by the Attorney General's Crime Prevention and Youth Services Division from the Department of Public Safety to provide school law enforcement officials and administrators with the tools and skills to identify and measure emerging aggression, bullying and cyber bullying activities. The goal of the program is to effectively engage, prevent and/or defuse human aggression and bullying as well as provide officials and administrators with the tools to effectively design, implement and administer crisis response plans, techniques, and protocols. In addition, the program will focus on a Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative that will affect juvenile justice and youth who are at-risk of entering the juvenile justice system. The goal is to reduce the number of youth being detained in secure detention facilities. The Juvenile Justice grant requires a 10% match.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with the United States Marshal's Service (USMS) pursuant to the Presidential Threat Protection Act of 2000. Federal funding is provided by the USMS to reimburse the Office for investigator overtime hours worked. The purpose of the agreement is to establish a permanent Fugitive Apprehension Task Force consisting of Federal, State, and local law enforcement authorities to locate and apprehend dangerous fugitives.

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STATE SUPPORT SPECIAL FUNDS

In FY 2014, the Legislature appropriated \$5,000,000.00 to the Attorney General's Office from the Budget Contingency Fund. These funds shall be available for expenditure for the British Petroleum (BP) litigation. Since this Office is unable to anticipate the resolution of this matter, we are requesting that the same amount be appropriated in FY 2015.

OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

Attorney General Fees are fees charged for legal services to State Agencies as required by the legislature. These fees are necessary to fund the ninety-four (94) attorneys and support staff providing legal services to state agencies, boards, and commissions.

State Prosecutor Education fees are generated as a result of State statute which mandates that a portion of city and county court monetary assessments collected for certain violations, misdemeanors and felonies be deposited to the State Prosecutor Education fund to be used to provide continuing legal education to State prosecutors.

Penalties and investigative costs collected in Medicaid fraud cases are earmarked to provide the 25% state match as required by the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit Federal grant award. These funds are deposited to State Treasury Fund 3071 and are transferred to State Treasury Fund 307B as matching funds are required.

Consumer Protection revenues are generated from restitution, civil penalties and investigative costs and provide funding for consumer education activities and investigations.

During the 2001 session, the Mississippi Legislature saw the need to increase the prosecution and investigation of crimes against vulnerable persons. The Legislature, in Senate Bill 2501, amended the law to require that effective July 1, 2001, the Department of Human Services must file preliminary reports of their investigations of reported abuse with the Attorney General's Office. Beginning in FY 2006, funds were provided as a result of State statute which mandates that a portion of city and county monetary assessments collected for certain violations, misdemeanors and felonies be deposited to the newly established Vulnerable Adults Training, Investigation and Prosecution Trust Fund. During the FY 2011 Legislative Session, lawmakers determined that there was a need to expand the Attorney General's Vulnerable Persons Unit. As a result, the monetary assessment was raised from fifty cents per violation to one dollar and fifty cents per violation. These revenues will enable the office to meet critical staffing needs and will increase the number of investigations and prosecutions of those who commit crimes of abuse, exploitation and neglect against vulnerable persons.

Beginning in FY 2006, the Attorney General's Child Support Prosecution Unit was funded as a result of State statute which mandates that a portion of city and county court monetary assessments collected for certain violations, misdemeanors and felonies be deposited to the newly established Child Support Prosecution Trust Fund. These funds are used for the investigation and prosecution of delinquent child support cases.

During the 2009 session, the Mississippi Legislature saw the need to provide a stable funding source for the Cyber Crime Unit and funds will be provided as a result of State statute which mandates that a portion of city and county court monetary assessments collected for certain violations, misdemeanors and felonies be deposited to the newly established Cyber Crime Training, Investigation and Prosecution Fund. These funds are used for the investigation and prosecution of crimes against children and training of law enforcement. During the FY 2011 Legislative Session, lawmakers determined that there was a need to expand the Attorney General's Cyber Crime Unit. As a result, the monetary assessment was raised from one dollar per violation to two dollars and fifty cents per violation. These revenues will enable the Unit to meet critical staffing needs and will increase the number of investigations and prosecutions of those who commit crimes against children (child predator/child pornography) and other internet crimes cases.

During 2009 session, the Mississippi Legislature saw the need to provide funding for the Domestic Violence Division

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which will also be provided as a result of State statute which mandates that a portion of city and county court monetary assessments collected for certain violations, misdemeanors and felonies be deposited to the newly established Domestic Violence Training Fund. As stated in House Bill 883, Section 7, these funds will be used "for the general administration and expenses of the Domestic Violence Division which provides training to law enforcement, prosecutors, judges, court clerks and other professionals in the field of domestic violence awareness, prevention and enforcement."

During the 2010 session, the Mississippi Legislature saw the need to establish the District Attorneys Operation Fund to be administered by the Attorney General. The State statute mandates that a portion of the filing fee on petitions to expunge an offense be deposited to the newly established District Attorneys Operation Fund. These funds will be used for the purpose of assisting district attorneys as determined necessary by the Attorney General.

During the 2012 session, the Mississippi Legislature established in House Bill 878, a special treasury fund to be known as the Children's Advocacy Centers Fund, which shall be administered by the Office of the Attorney General. The purpose of the fund shall be for training forensic interviewers in child abuse and child sexual abuse cases, training for law enforcement officers and prosecutors about child abuse cases, expanding the number of Children's Advocacy Centers of Mississippi to underserved areas, and other related purposes. Funding will be provided through a monetary assessment on traffic violations.

During the 2012 session, the Mississippi Legislature established in House Bill 878, a special treasury fund to be known as the Motorcycle Officers Training Program Fund, which shall be administered by the Office of the Attorney General. The purpose of the fund shall be for the training of state and local law enforcement officers, including, but not limited to, motorcycle officers training. All courses provided under the Motorcycle Officers Training Program shall be administered and approved by the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Association. Funding will be provided through a monetary assessment on other misdemeanors.

An annual assessment of \$150,000 in funding is received from the Workers' Compensation Assessment Fund and used by the Insurance Integrity Enforcement Bureau to investigate and prosecute Workers' Compensation fraud.

In FY 2013, \$800,000 was transferred from the Department of Health's Tobacco Control Commission as specified in Section 13 of Attorney General House Bill 1587, to fund the Attorney General Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division. In FY 2014, \$800,000 will be transferred from the Tobacco Control Commission as specified in Section 13 of Attorney General House Bill 1642. Funds received from the Tobacco Control Commission are used by the Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division for the reduction of youth access to tobacco, including tobacco enforcement checks/undercover buy operations, enforcement procedures related to tobacco permit violators, follow-up activities on violators, training of retail store owners and clerks, and "Clerk or Cop" operations.

In FY 2013, the Attorney General's Office Crime Prevention Youth Services Division received funds from the Annie W. Casey Foundation which will carry into FY 2014 and 2015 to support the Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI).

Crime Victims Compensation Funds support the administrative function of the Crime Victims Compensation Division and consist of Victim Compensation Fees and Criminal Law Assessment Fines generated as a result of State statute.

The State of Mississippi joined the \$25 billion Joint State-Federal Mortgage Servicing Settlement with the nation's five largest mortgage companies (Bank of America, Citi, Chase, GMAC, and Wells Fargo) over foreclosure abuses, fraud, and unacceptable nationwide mortgage servicing practices. In FY 2013, Mississippi received a direct payment of \$13,580,374.00 to be used "for purposes intended to avoid preventable foreclosures, to ameliorate the effects of the foreclosure crisis, to enhance law enforcement efforts to prevent and prosecute financial fraud, or unfair or deceptive acts or practices and to compensate the States for costs resulting from the alleged unlawful conduct of the Defendants." Of the \$13,580,374.00, our Office sent \$7,690,038.00 directly to the State General Fund. However, in order for the State to comply with the Court Order, we determined that it would be necessary to retain \$5,890,336.00

of these funds to administer a 3 year program that will provide consumer assistance to victims of mortgage fraud. The program is being accomplished through a consortium which includes the Attorney General's Office, MS Center for Justice, MS Center for Legal Services, North MS Rural Legal Services, Mississippi Home Corporation, Money Management International, and the MS Military Department. The Legislature has provided the Office with the necessary spending authority to accomplish this mission in both Year 1 (FY 2013) and Year 2 (FY 2014). We are requesting the necessary spending authority in Year 3 (FY 2015) to complete these efforts.

TREASURY FUND/BANK

Attorney General's Office Imprest Fund, Community Bank, #100-5009939, is the agency's petty cash account used for general authorized expenditures.

Attorney General's Office Investigation Fund, Community Bank, #100-5009921, is an imprest fund utilized for costs (often confidential in nature) related to Drug Investigations, White-Collar Crime, Cyber Crime, Consumer and Medicaid Fraud cases.

Mississippi Attorney General Sponsorship Fund, Trustmark Bank, #100-89-925-20, is used to support agency-sponsored conferences and events. Revenues consist of donations and registration fees collected specifically for each event. Activities of this account are self-supporting.

Attorney General's Cafeteria Plan Checking, Bancorpsouth, #60758265, is established in order to pay reimbursements to employees participating in the Cafeteria Plan. Funds are deposited into the account each month from employee payroll deductions. Documentation is submitted to the plan administrator and checks are processed by the plan administrator. This office receives the checks from the plan administrator and distributes them to appropriate employees.

The Attorney General Contingent Fund, Trustmark Bank, #100-091-9621, is used for the purpose of holding and distributing monies, expenses, and fees from judgments, settlements, restitution, and penalties, etc.

The Training Program is charged with the responsibility of providing training for Mississippi Prosecutors. The Program was statutorily created, Section 37-26-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), to provide Continuing Legal Education and technical assistance to state, county, and municipal prosecutors. Further, as statutorily dictated in Section 43-21-117, all youth court prosecutors and county prosecuting attorneys who serve as youth court prosecutors shall be required to receive juvenile justice training approved by the Mississippi Attorney General's Office and regular annual continuing education in the field of juvenile justice. The statute mandates that a set amount of fees collected for certain violations, misdemeanors, and felonies be deposited to the State Prosecutor Education Fund and administered by the Attorney General.

The Program also provides technical assistance for District Attorneys, county prosecuting attorneys, and municipal prosecuting attorneys as provided by Section 37-26-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972) by training investigators, victim assistance coordinators, worthless check unit personnel, and others who provide technical support for District Attorneys, county prosecuting attorneys, and municipal prosecuting attorneys. The Program serves as a tool for liaison for the prosecutors and the Mississippi Legislature, as well as various State, Federal, and local criminal justice agencies and groups.

II. Program Objective:

The primary objective of the Training Program is to enhance criminal justice services to the citizens of the State of Mississippi by providing critical, applicable, and timely continuing legal education for State, county, and municipal prosecuting attorneys.

State, county, and municipal prosecutors are provided with the necessary Continuing Legal Education credits to maintain the required membership in the Mississippi State Bar, with classes focused on prosecutor specific topics which are not otherwise available in the State of Mississippi. The primary objective is furthered by offering similar prosecution specific curriculum for the statutorily created prosecutor technical support agents: investigators, victim assistance coordinators, and worthless check personnel.

I. Program Description:

The Attorney General as stated in Section 7-5-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), "...shall be the chief legal officer and advisor for the state, both civil and criminal, and is charged with managing all litigation on behalf of the state...."

Civil litigation provides trial and appellate legal representation to the State, State agencies and boards, and State officials and employees sued in their official and individual capacities. Civil actions are as varied as discrimination, personal injury, voting rights, contracts, Section 1983 prisoner litigation, civil rights, and administrative appeals in all state and federal courts.

Criminal litigation represents the State in all direct criminal appeals, post-conviction review, federal habeas corpus, and other criminal proceedings in the Supreme Court of Mississippi, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, the United States District Courts for Mississippi and on certiorari to the Supreme Court of the United States. In Mississippi, the convicted defendant in a criminal case has an automatic statutory right of appeal to the Mississippi Supreme Court from a circuit court judgment. A brief is filed on each of these appeals by the Criminal Litigation Division of the Attorney General's Office on behalf of the State. Oral arguments are held at the request of the Court. (See Miss. Code Ann. 1972, Section 99-35-1.) State appeals are limited by statute and in practice are handled by the District Attorneys. Death penalty appeals and federal habeas corpus cases are handled by a sub-division of the Criminal Litigation Division handling the direct appeals, state post-conviction review, and all federal habeas corpus litigation. All extraditions matters are also handled by this division.

The Litigation Division does not solicit its cases and has little control regarding the number of cases which staff must handle.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Litigation Program is to manage all litigation on behalf of the State in a timely and professional manner and to maintain a docket of such cases. Also, the Civil Litigation Division will handle the BP Oil Spill Litigation with assistance from outside legal counsel. Five million dollars from the Budget Contingency Fund has been appropriated by the Legislature to handle BP litigation.

This section also reviews and approves or disapproves all Interlocal Agreements; fulfills the preclearance requirements under Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act by submitting to the United States Department of Justice legislation having any potential impact on voting or office holding in Mississippi; fulfills the Statutory Advisor responsibilities including the review and monitoring of the publication of the Mississippi Code and its annual supplements; provides technical and legal assistance and training to local government officials who generate the vast majority of opinion requests; and provides litigation support and expertise on cases as directed by the Attorney General including Voting Rights, separation of powers, and other constitutional cases.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Opinions Program is to respond to all requests for Official Attorney General Opinions in a timely manner, to respond to requests for assistance by telephone, and to conduct lectures and training seminars for local government attorneys and officials throughout the State. All legislation falling within the scope of the Voting Rights Act must be submitted by the designated date to the United States Department of Justice for preclearance by the Justice Department. The Statutory Advisor, working with the Joint Legislative Committee for Code Revision and its staff attorneys, must review and monitor the publication of the Mississippi Code and its annual supplements, and review, recommend revision, and prepare summaries of proposed constitutional initiatives within the designated time frame. Interlocal Agreements must be reviewed within the statutory time limit. Litigation support and expertise in various important areas of the law must be provided in a timely and effective manner.

In accordance with Section 7-5-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), and case law explaining the constitutional powers of the Attorney General of Mississippi under Section 173 of the Mississippi Constitution, the Office of the Attorney General is responsible for representing the State, its officials, and the state agencies carrying out the powers of the executive branch of government. The primary responsibility for the State Agency Contracts Program is for each attorney assigned to the Program to handle the day-to-day legal representation of state agencies. The Legislature has required the Attorney General to charge legal service fees to the various state agencies the Office represents. To accomplish this task, the Attorney General's Office has developed two (2) types of contracts from which state agencies may choose to pay for legal services. The first is a contract which charges a flat rate of \$65.00 per hour. This rate, while inadequate to cover actual costs incurred, has not been increased due to the State's budgetary constraints in an effort not to overburden financially stressed state agencies. The second is a contract in which the agency pays for a specific attorney for full-time representation. Agencies needing a large amount of legal assistance are better served by the contract for a full-time attorney position while most small agencies choose the hourly service contract.

The Attorney General's Office has established a time keeping system for each attorney to record their time spent working for a specific agency. A detailed report and summary report of the attorney daily timesheets are sent to the agency for review and approval with the invoice for services.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the State Agency Contracts Program is for the Attorney General and his assistants to render such services deemed necessary to assist in advising and in representing the State and its entities as appropriate. The State Agency Contracts Program ensures an agency that specialization is provided and continuity of services is maintained.

I. Program Description:

The Attorney General's Other Mandated Programs consists of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, the Public Integrity Division, the Consumer Protection Division, the Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division, and the Crime Prevention and Victim Services' Youth Services Division. These programs are fully comprehensive law enforcement units staffed by criminal investigators, auditors, and prosecuting attorneys who serve in combating the corrupt, deceptive, and illegal practices of unscrupulous medical providers, public officials, drug traffickers, and business enterprises.

The Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, established by Section 43-13-219, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), is responsible for the statewide investigation and prosecution of fraud committed by Medicaid providers as well as the provision of information to professional boards such as the Pharmacy Board and the Board of Medical Licensure regarding licensing actions. This Unit is also responsible for the investigation of abuse, neglect, and financial exploitation perpetrated upon vulnerable adults who are residents or patients in health care facilities. Funding for this program is received from a federal grant which reimburses 75% of the operating expenses. The Unit is re-certified annually by the Office of the Inspector General, Health and Human Services.

The Public Integrity Division is charged with the responsibility of conducting official investigations in accordance with Section 7-5-59, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), which details white collar crime and official corruption and assisting district attorneys and local law enforcement officials in the performance of their duties; and with the responsibility of impaneling a statewide grand jury to investigate and charge large-scale drug offenders in accordance with Section 13-7-1, et seq., Miss Code Ann. (1972). This Unit receives complaints and allegations from a variety of sources: state and local officials who have discovered such conduct in the performance of their routine responsibilities; calls and letters from citizens throughout the State who have observed actions that are believed to be improper; and referral of cases from local law enforcement officials and prosecutors which could better be handled by this Unit. The Public Integrity Division is comprised of both attorneys and investigators who work closely together to ensure that cases are efficiently prosecuted and also work with the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and other state and local law enforcement entities in identifying and dismantling large drug organizations through both criminal prosecution and civil forfeiture actions. The Public Integrity Division serves as the enforcement arm of the Mississippi Charitable Solicitations Act which requires charities to properly register with the Secretary of State's Office. The Cyber Crime Unit, Child Support Prosecution Unit, and Vulnerable Persons Investigative Unit are also a part of the Public Integrity Division. [Section 43-47-7, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] The Vulnerable Persons Unit was created to prosecute those accused of crimes against vulnerable persons and provide training to law enforcement, judges, district attorneys, state agencies and investigators at the Department of Human Services. The unit receives complaints from the Department of Human Services and other law enforcement agencies as well as complaints from other concerned individuals. [Section 43-47-5, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972)]

The Consumer Protection Division was created in 1974 by Section 75-24-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), as amended. The Consumer Protection Act of 1994 amended and strengthened this Section. Consumer Protection handles a wide range of complaints from citizens located throughout the State of Mississippi. These complaints include, but are not limited to, lottery and sweepstakes scams, new and used car sales, and telemarketing fraud. Consumer Protection fields thousands of calls and emails each year. The Division is also charged with the investigation and prosecution of identity theft, home repair fraud, and intellectual property crimes. The Division promotes consumer education through participation in civic group functions, student lectures, law enforcement seminars, and other types of presentations throughout the State, as well as publishes and distributes public education brochures. Mediation of business complaints and investigation of deceptive business practices constitute a large part of the Division's activities. To carry out its mission, Consumer Protection is also authorized to exercise various types of enforcement activities, including subpoenas, cease and desist orders, assurances of voluntary compliance, injunctions, criminal prosecutions, and collection of civil penalties.

The Domestic Violence Division was created in October of 2006. The Domestic Violence Division provides training for law enforcement dispatchers, judges, private attorneys, prosecutors, court personnel, vicitim advocates and other professionals including medical professionals, in the areas of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, sexual assault, domestic abuse protection orders, and related matters including human trafficking and victim rights. The Division works with other divisions within the Attorney General's Office to accomplish training goals (Crime Prevention and Victim Services, Prosecutor Training Division and Cyber Crime Division). The Division produces educational and training guides to support their efforts. The Division staff assists local prosecutors when requested in the prosecution of domestic violence offenders, and also works in conjunction with other public entities and non-profit organizations for the promotion of domestic violence prevention. The Domestic Violence Division also administers the Mississippi Domestic Abuse Protection Order Registry and trains court clerks, dispatch and law

enforcement on usage of the Registry and the Mississippi Uniform Offense Report. By serving as a resource to all those who come into contact with domestic violence victims, the Division brings the full weight of the State of Mississippi to combat the crime of domestic violence, and to achieve the joint goals of holding offenders accountable and ensuring that our victims remain safe from further violence.

The Alcohol & Tobacco Enforcement Division ensures compliance with state laws that prohibit the sale of tobacco products and alcohol to minors. The Crime Prevention & Victim Services' Youth Services Division supports prevention efforts that reduce juvenile delinquency, truancy, exploitation, and child abuse and neglect through collaboration with after-school programs, mentoring initiatives, and other proactive youth endeavors. The Division partners with other state agencies, as well as nonprofit organizations, to expand and promote services for at-risk children.

II. Program Objective:

The overall objective of the Attorney General's Other Mandated Programs is to investigate and prosecute all illegal activities relating to Medicaid fraud, elder abuse/neglect/exploitation, drug trafficking, and misconduct of public officials and business enterprises. In addition, assistance is provided to United States Attorneys, district attorneys, and federal and local law enforcement agencies in the performance of their duties. Other Mandated Programs addresses juvenile prevention, intervention, and juvenile justice alternatives. The Program is also involved in the war on drugs by utilizing the State's asset forfeiture statutes and providing prosecutors and law enforcement officers with pre-arrest asset investigative assessments and post-arrest legal and prosecutorial assistance.

I. Program Description:

The Crime Victims Compensation Division provides financial assistance and support services to victims of violent crime and their family members. Compensation is awarded for medical care, rehabilitation, counseling services for the victim and the victim's family member(s), funeral expenses, loss of wages for the victim or claimant, loss of support for dependents of deceased victims, crime scene clean-up, court related travel, execution travel, domestic violence temporary housing assistance, domestic violence relocation assistance, and repair/replacement. The overall maximum allowable for awards payable is twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), with limits applied to each benefit type. Also, the Crime Victim Compensation Division reimburses medical providers authorized payments for costs of sexual assault medical forensic examinations. Additionally, the Crime Victim Compensation Division provides ongoing training to victim service providers, law enforcement agencies, medical and mental health providers and others across the state who provide information, support and care to victims. The Victim Assistance Program was established with a federal grant in FY 2000 to provide enhanced direct services to crime victims. The program serves as a single point of contact for crime victims and the public-at-large in the State of Mississippi providing information, referral, advocacy and support to persons who contact the program.

The Address Confidentiality Program (ACP), mandated by 2008 Legislation, became effective July 1, 2009. Persons enrolled in the ACP may request that state/local government agencies use a substitute address designated by the Attorney General's Office. The ACP can help a relocated victim of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking in their attempt to keep their new address confidential.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Crime Victims Compensation Division is to relieve the hardships of crime victims and assist in their recovery whenever possible by providing compensation, direct services, advocacy, and public awareness and education to victims, their family members, law enforcement, court officials, and the public-at-large.

The Fiscal Year 2015 Budget Request for the Attorney General's Office includes the appropriation for eight (8) programs - Support Services, Training, Opinions, Litigation, State Agency Contracts, Insurance Integrity Enforcement, Other Mandated Programs, and Crime Victims Compensation. These programs represent the combined budget of the State's largest law office. By mandate of Article 6, Section 173, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, there shall be an Office of Attorney General. This Office is entrusted with management of all legal affairs of the State and prosecution of all suits, civil or criminal, in which the State has an interest. The Attorney General has the power to control and manage all litigation on behalf of the state and to maintain all suits necessary for enforcement of State laws, preservation of order, and protection of public rights.

The Attorney General's Office is requesting the funds to continue its cost of operations at the FY 2014 funding level along with the positions and funds escalated through the Department of Finance and Administration for the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, DUI Prosecution and Training Unit, Tobacco and Alcohol Enforcement Division and National Mortgage Foreclosure Settlement. This will allow the Office to maintain the level of service and training critical to meet the mandates set in statute for each of the programs. House Bill 673, passed during the 2013 Legislative Session, revised the title of the Human Trafficking Act and created the position of "Human Trafficking Coordinator" and the "Relief for Victims of Human Trafficking Fund" within the Attorney General's Office. To date, the Relief for Victims of Human Trafficking Fund has received no funding.

In FY 2013 the Legislature appropriated \$8,424,443 in general funds to our Office. This appropriation matched the FY 2012 appropriation less the general funds cut of \$136,969. Our FY 2014 general funds appropriation is \$86,893 above the FY 2013 amount for a total of \$8,511,336. While this increase does partially cover the mandatory increase in the agency Retirement match, it does not address the fact that the general funds appropriated are more than \$1 million below the \$9,652,000 needed for cost continuation. In order to meet our financial obligations and retain the necessary staffing level to carry out our duties and responsibilities, we continue to utilize our matching fund reserves. We will be facing the same budget problems in FY 2015 if our general fund appropriation is not increased to the requested amount.

Since matching fund revenues cannot be projected from year to year, it is important that we maintain an adequate level of reserves to ensure that we have the match funds necessary to operate our federally funded Medicaid Fraud Control program. The annual award totals more than 2.7 million and requires a 25% match. In order to draw down our Federal dollars, we must be able to continually meet this match. For this reason, our match reserves should be considered Federal fund equivalents. Without them, we will lose Federal funding. Thus, the continued use of these reserves to offset general fund cuts will jeopardize a program that not only investigates and prosecutes fraud against medicaid providers, but also protects our most vulnerable citizens from abuse, neglect and exploitation.

To stabilize our special fund matching reserves and ensure that we continue to have the dollars necessary to draw down Federal funds for the Medicaid Fraud program, we are requesting that our general funds be restored to the FY 2010 level of \$9,652,000.

The Attorney General's Office received several grants during Fiscal Year 2013 which have carried forward into Fiscal Year 2014 and will carry forward into Fiscal Year 2015. These grants include a Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Medicaid Fraud Control grant for the investigation and prosecution of fraud committed by medical providers and investigation and prosecution of cases involving abuse, neglect and exploitation of residents/patients in health care facilities; a Department of Justice Grant to assist public servants in the repayment of student loans; a Department of Public Safety Grant to improve the quality and efficiency of domestic violence and sexual assault prosecutions; a Department of Justice Grant to enhance and expand the Crime Victims Program; a Department of Public Safety Grant which funds the Division of Victim Assistance within the Crime Victim Compensation Division and provides direct assistance to victims; a Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs Grant to establish and operate an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force; a Department of Justice Grant to establish and operate an Intellectual Property (IP) program; a U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA)

award to carry out inspections of entities and retail establishments that sell or advertise cigarettes and/or smokeless tobacco products to determine whether those entities are complying with the Tobacco Control Act; and a Department of Public Safety Grant to improve the quality of DUI prosecutions, thus increasing the conviction rate for those offenses. The Office also received a Juvenile Justice Block Grant from the Department of Public Safety to provide school law enforcement officials and administrators with the tools and skills to identify and measure emerging aggression, bullying, and cyber bullying activities; effectively engage, prevent and/or defuse human aggression and bullying; and equip school law enforcement officials and administrators with the tools to effectively design, implement and administer crisis response plans, techniques, and protocols. This Block Grant along with a grant from the Annie W. Casey Foundation will continue to focus on a Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI) that will affect juvenile justice and youth who are at-risk of entering the juvenile justice system with the goal of reducing the number of youth being detained in secure detention facilities.

The Support Services Program provides administrative and technical support in the areas of management (planning, organizing and staffing), finance, personnel, accounting, budgeting, grant management and reporting, information systems, purchasing, payroll, internal auditing, maintenance of law library, and management of all legal contracts.

The Training Program is charged with the responsibility of providing training for Mississippi prosecutors. The Program was statutorily created, Section 37-26-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), to provide Continuing Legal Education (CLE) and technical assistance to state, county, and municipal prosecutors. The statute mandates that a set amount of fees collected for certain violations, misdemeanors, and felonies be deposited to the State Prosecutor Education Fund and administered by the Attorney General.

The Litigation Program is responsible for managing all litigation for the State. The Attorney General as stated in Section 7-5-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), "... shall be the chief legal officer and advisor for the state, both civil and criminal, and is charged with managing all litigation on behalf of the state ..."

The Opinions Program researches, prepares, and distributes formal written opinions in response to questions of law from all state and local entities, officials, and their attorneys. In accordance with Section 7-5-25, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), the Attorney General shall give his opinion, without fee, to any state or local public official.

The State Agency Contracts Program is responsible for handling the day-to-day legal representation of state agencies. In accordance with Section 7-5-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), and case law explaining the constitutional powers of the Attorney General of Mississippi under Section 173 of the Mississippi Constitution, the Attorney General's Office is responsible for representing the State, its officials, and the state agencies carrying out the powers of the executive branch of government.

The Insurance Integrity Enforcement Bureau was created during the 1998 Regular Session of the Legislature in House Bill 428. As stated in Section 7-5-301, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), of the enabling legislation, "The duty of the bureau is to investigate and prosecute claims of insurance abuses and crimes involving insurance."

The Other Mandated Programs consists of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, the Public Integrity Division (inclusive of the Cyber Crime, Vulnerable Persons, and Child Support Prosecution Units), the Consumer Protection Division, the Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division, the Crime Prevention and Victim Services' Youth Services Division, and the Domestic Violence Division. The Majority of these programs are fully comprehensive law enforcement units staffed by criminal investigators, auditors, and prosecuting attorneys who serve in combating the corrupt, deceptive, and illegal practices of medical providers, public officials, drug traffickers, and business enterprises. The other programs ensure the collaboration with other state agencies and nonprofit organizations as to the safety and well-being of children, domestic violence and human trafficking training and initiatives, and other issues affecting children and youth.

The Crime Victims Compensation Division provides financial assistance and support services to victims of violent crime and their family members. Compensation is awarded for medical care, rehabilitation, counseling services for the victim and the victim's family member(s), funeral expenses, loss of wages for the victim or claimant and loss of support for dependents of deceased victims. This division is also responsible for administering the Address Confidentiality Program which provides a layer of protection for domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking victims fleeing their assailants. The Victim Assistance Program, established with a federal grant in FY 2000, serves as a single point of contact for crime victims and the public-at-large in the State of Mississippi and provides information, referral, advocacy and support to persons who contact the Office for victim assistance.

The Budget Request by major object for Fiscal Year 2015 is as follows:

Personal Services - Salaries

The Attorney General's Office is requesting \$22,874,020 in salaries, wages and fringe benefits. Salaries comprise 61.78% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. The largest portion of these funds ensures that competent attorneys with appropriate expertise represent the State of Mississippi in all actions from litigation to state agency representation. Critical support for these attorneys is provided by the legal secretarial staff. Such support is necessary in assisting the attorneys in meeting deadlines, filing appropriate documents in various courts, and maintaining case files and dockets.

The second largest portion of funds ensures the investigation of Medicaid fraud, elder abuse/neglect/exploitation, white collar crime, drug trafficking, vulnerable person abuse, cyber crime, consumer fraud, insurance fraud, and illegal sale of tobacco products and alcohol to minors. These investigators perform field investigations, provide evidence for litigation, and testify in court as necessary. Five (5) attorney positions, nine (9) investigator positions, one (1) program administrator position, one (1) nurse position, and two (2) support positions have been re-escalated for FY 2014 in these areas.

A small portion of salaries provides for staffing Crime Prevention and Victim Services, Prosecutor Training, Domestic Violence, and Crime Victims Compensation. The remainder of salaries is dedicated to the administrative support staff which provides administrative and technical support to the Attorney General's Office.

Personal Services - Travel

This Office is requesting \$1,055,500 in this category. Travel costs comprise 2.85% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. The in-state travel is used to pay for legal staff to represent the Office in matters relating to pending litigation, to attend court, investigative travel, annual meetings for CLE, conducting investigations of retail establishments that sell tobacco products and alcohol to minors and seminars held outside the Jackson area. The out-of-state travel request is for attending NAAG (National Association of Attorneys General) meetings held for various staff members, training required for Medicaid Fraud and Insurance Fraud Investigators, presenting arguments before the Fifth Circuit and U.S. Supreme Court, and providing CLE training to prosecutors sponsored by the National District Attorneys Association.

Contractual Services

\$8,998,100 is requested in the Contractual Services Category. Contractual costs comprise 24.30% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. Details of the request in this category are as follows:

A. Tuition, Rewards & Awards

\$80,500 is requested in this area for employee training and tuition at various conferences and seminars. This

category also includes the payment of registration fees for conferences.

B. Communications, Transportation & Utilities

\$53,400 is requested in this area for postage, transportation of goods, and electricity. Freight is primarily associated with the delivery of various law books and for receiving and returning data processing equipment items to the manufacturer for repairs covered under warranty agreements.

C. Public Information

\$25,000 is requested in this area for public service announcements for Consumer Protection and Crime Prevention and Youth Services.

D. Rents

\$1,176,120 is requested in this area to cover the estimated cost for rental of building and floor space at the renovated Walter Sillers Building and the Eldon L. Bolton Building. Other costs include rental of office equipment, i.e., copiers and postage meters, etc.; rental of audiovisual equipment for training conferences; and rental of exhibits, displays and conference rooms.

E. Repairs & Service

\$54,200 is requested in this area for minor repairs to the offices in the Sillers and Bolton Buildings; repairs to the office passenger vehicles; and various repairs to items of office equipment and other equipment that are not covered under maintenance agreements. These items include typewriters, calculators, transcribers, fax machines and dictating machines.

F. Fees, Professional & Other Services

\$6,546,170 is requested in this area for SAAS fees; MMRS fees; SPAHRS fees; Department of Audit fees; fees paid to outside legal counsel; medical doctor fees and dental fees for expert witnesses; other medical fees for expert witnesses for Medicaid Fraud Control Unit and physicals for investigators; psychologists fees for evaluation prior to hiring of law enforcement personnel and for the Office's Employee Assistance Program; SPB fees; Personnel Services Contract fees for contractual workers such as law enforcement investigators, minors, and interns, associated travel, and travel of county and city prosecutors; court costs, filing fees, and court reporters; recording and notary fees; witness fees and expenses; laboratory and testing fees for evidence; temporary employment fees for legal secretaries; speaker fees for prosecutor training programs; contractual worker-FICA Match; and other fees and services including payments for services in complex litigation matters. The Legislature appropriated funds out of the State Support Special Funds (Budget Contingency Fund) for the ongoing British Petroleum (BP) litigation.

G. Other Contractual Services

\$180,330 is requested in this area for the annual tort claims assessment; insurance and faithful performance bonds on the Attorney General and staff; insurance on computer equipment; membership dues to the Mississippi Bar Association and other professional organizations; and VISA procurement card purchases.

H. Data Processing

\$847,380 is requested in this area for fees to outside vendors for the continued development and implementation of the Attorney General's Office and the District Attorney's CRIMES Case Management System; ITS fees for

procurement costs; installation costs for IS and telecommunications hardware; ITS basic telephone charges; long distance charges; cell phone charges; public network access charges; internet charges; IS training and education to allow IS employees and staff to attend courses on network maintenance, web design, database administration, and office suite software; service charges to ITS for disk storage, ADABAS usage, batch processing, CICS usage, and Capital Complex network charges; software acquisition to include upgrades for Microsoft SQL, Oracle, WordPerfect, and Microsoft Office Suite, etc.; pager rental; repair and maintenance charges for personal computers, laser printers, plotters, laptops, file servers, network disk back-up units, scanners, firewall, routers, switches, and the telephone system; and software maintenance for CRIMES Case Management System, Norton Anti-Virus, Microsoft, VMWare, Document Management System, Bomgar Remote Assistance, Crime Victims Claim Assistant, Oracle, Domestic Violence Uniform Reporting System, and Protective Orders Registry.

I. Other

\$35,000 is requested in this category for petty cash expense in relationship to drug buy money, investigation related expenses for the Public Integrity Division, Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, Consumer Protection Division, and Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division, and prior year expense.

Commodities

We are requesting \$569,290 in this category. Commodity costs comprise 1.53% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. Below is a detailed request of this category:

A. Maintenance & Construction Materials & Supplies

\$800 for minor renovations and/or repairs.

B. Printing & Office Supplies & Materials

\$163,000 is requested in this category for printing letterhead, envelopes, budget and various documents; duplication and reproduction supplies (toner) for copiers and printers; office supplies and materials for entire Office; paper supplies for various printers, faxes, and copiers; law library books; and miscellaneous office equipment items valued at less than \$500.

C. Equipment, Repair Parts, Supplies & Accessories

\$179,500 is requested for fuel, tires and tubes for automobiles and repair and replacement parts for vehicles, radios and office equipment.

D. Professional & Scientific Supplies & Materials

\$400 is requested for photographic supplies and film processing.

E. Other Supplies & Materials

\$225,590 is requested for minor repairs; food for business meetings mainly for prosecutor training; uniforms and wearing apparel for investigators; repair parts and accessories for non-major computer components, such as modems, scanners, memory upgrades, etc.; ammunition; other supplies and materials; other equipment less than \$500; small purchase of commodities on procurement card; petty cash expenses; and prior year expense.

2. Equipment

\$468,500 is requested in this area for replacement and purchase of office machines, furniture, fixtures, equipment and IS equipment. Equipment costs comprise 1.26% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. IS equipment to be purchased will be four (4) Apple displays, fifteen (15) Apple Mac Books, two (2) Apple Pro desktops, one (1) wireless controller, twenty-two (22) desktops, thirty (30) laptops, one (1) disaster recovery system, two (2) forensic computers, five (5) internet cameras, one (1) intrusion detection system, one (1) inventory scanner, ten (10) network infrastructure switches, one (1) network modem, two (2) network storage hard drives, one (1) color printer, seven (7) portable printers, five (5) laser printers, two (2) mobile radios, three (3) file servers, two (2) network switches, ten (10) tablets, and one (1) Webex internet conference system.

3. Vehicles

\$260,000 is requested for the replacement of eleven (11) high mileage undercover law enforcement vehicles. Vehicle costs comprise 0.70% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

4. Wireless Communication Devices

\$4,000 is requested for the replacement of twenty (20) PDAs. Wireless Communication costs comprise 0.01% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

Subsidies, Loans & Grants

The \$2,792,110 requested is for the purpose of coordinating and overseeing the implementation of the Casey Foundation Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI). The Victim Compensation Division will administer grants to various qualified recipients and will make payments to crime victims for medical costs, travel, and crime scene clean-up. Disbursement of funds to the Children's Advocacy Center and for motorcycle officer training are captured in this category as well as the administration of the final year of the National Mortgage Foreclosure Settlement funds allocated to provide consumer assistance to victims of mortgage fraud in compliance with settlement language. Additionally, Subsidies, Loans & Grants costs comprise 7.54% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

Overall

This budget is funded from general funds, state support special funds, federal grant monies, revenues generated through fees charged for services provided by attorneys representing state agencies, restitution and penalties, State monetary assessments for certain violations, misdemeanors and felonies to support prosecutors training, motorcycle officer training, children advocacy centers, and vulnerable person and child support investigations, Workers' Compensation Commission Administrative Expense Fund, Tobacco Control Commission funds, and state grant monies. In conclusion, as stated previously, the Attorney General's Office is requesting to fund this Office at its FY 2014 level including escalated funds and positions in addition to requesting restoration of our general funds to the FY 2010 level of \$9,652,000 to stabilize our special fund matching reserves necessary to draw down Federal funds for the Medicaid Fraud program. The sums requested are the result of careful planning and reflect those resources essential for the performance of the Attorney General's constitutional mandates. Program requests are interwoven to produce a well-integrated budget. Consequently, the ability of the Attorney General's Office to fully perform its duties requires a balanced, broad-based allocation of resources.
