FEDERAL FUNDS

The Federal Funds are made up of one major federal program and 2 small programs: The Manufacturing Extension Partnership of Mississippi (InnovateMEP.ms) the major program and is an organization that works to assist Mississippi's Manufacturing organizations. InnovateMEP.ms works with partner organizations to provide expertise and services tailored to the most critical needs of area manufacturers, which range from process improvements and worker training to business practices and applications of information technology. InnovateMEP.ms partners include the Mississippi Manufacturers Association, several Mississippi Universities and Community Colleges, and private sector service providers.

In addition to our state-wide partners, InnovateMEP.ms is part of a nationwide network of not-for-profit centers with more than 400 locations nationwide whose mission is to provide small and medium sized manufacturers with the tools necessary to achieve maximum success. The centers, serving all 50 states and Puerto Rico, are linked together through the Department of Commerce's National Institute of Standards and Technology. By being a part of such a large network of manufacturing service providers, we can deliver nearly any service that is required by a Mississippi Manufacturer.

In FY2014, Innovate Mississippi's InnovateMEP Center was awarded an add-on contract to the regular MEP agreement to begin a program called "Make It in America" that focuses on reshoring and sourcing of products within the United States. Innovate Mississippi is using our existing InnovateMEP network connections for this program in order to maximize the impact. This is a 3 year program.

In FY2014, Innovate Mississippi received a 18 month grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission to work on "Innovation Deployment" within the ARC region. Innovation Deployment is the connecting of new innovations with existing company capabilities to create value and grow the companies. Innovate Mississippi personnel are primary deployed out of Tupelo to administer this grant.

In FY2014, the Department of Energy contracted with the Mississippi Development Authority to conduct an 18 month program focusing on Combined Heat and Power (CHP). MDA contracted with Innovate Mississippi to leverage our extensive experience in CleanTech system development and deployment and the specific expertise of Innovate Mississippi employee, Dr. Sumesh Arora.

OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

Launched in 2002 by Innovate Mississippi, Pointe Innovation magazine is the only publication devoted solely to innovation and technology-based economic development in Mississippi. This 80-page, four-color quarterly magazine is distributed to 25,000 professional and household decision-makers. Pointe Innovation magazine can be found in every Mississippi county and in many of our neighboring states.

When Innovate Mississippi leaders began looking for a vehicle to promote the culture of innovation in Mississippi, they kept coming back to the question: If we don't tell our story who will? Pointe Innovation was created to share the good news about innovation and technology in Mississippi. There are companies throughout our state creating innovative applications and products that will change our world. In addition, there are communities all around Mississippi focused on creating a business and cultural environment to support high-tech, high-growth companies.

Private funds are generated from management fees on monies generated from services provided by the Mississippi Angel Network, High Technology Conference fees, and other revenues generated from private company contracts.

I. Program Description:

MISSION:

Innovate Mississippi is a non-profit, public-private partnership formed to meet the recommendations of the legislatively endorsed State Science and Technology Action Plan. Innovate Mississippi Board of Directors is comprised of leadership from the private, academic and public sectors in Mississippi. The primary mission of Innovate Mississippi is to drive innovation and technology-based economic development efforts throughout the state, with the end goal of facilitating wealth creation through higher paying, quality jobs.

As the state's only group that assists companies in securing early-stage private equity, Innovate Mississippi works closely with others (mostly SBDC & MDA) to seamlessly refer companies who fit each group's unique focus. Innovate Mississippi also focuses on converting the state's research capacity into Mississippi companies.

Overview

To accomplish this mission, Innovate Mississippi is organized in three centers:

- " The Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship
- " The Center for Innovation Led Economic Development
- " The Center for Capital Formation

All of our efforts are led through the three centers. Goals are also set for each activity under each center as outlined below.

Performance Effectiveness Methodology & Review for Centers & Projects

Each of the three centers offer specialized services to achieve Innovate Mississippi's mission to drive innovation and technology-based economic development for the State of Mississippi.

The Goals for Innovate Mississippi and for each of the Centers are derived from the 1998 Science and Technology Action Plan and reviewed periodically by the Innovate Mississippi Board of Directors. Such reviews occurred in June 2007 and in July 2009. In the long-term, each project of Innovate Mississippi has overall project goals and measurement criteria as shown below. In addition, annual metrics are determined for each project based on the overall goals. These are updated and reviewed each quarter with the Innovate Mississippi Board of Directors. The performance measures are listed in the Program Performance Indicators and Measures section of our LBO submittal.

II. Program Objective:

Innovate Mississippi's Mission and Objectives are realized through the implementation of the following long-term goals:

- o Assist companies especially early-stage innovation entrepreneurs by helping them plan and grow their businesses.
- o Connect investors and investment capital with early-stage companies.
- o Assist economic development partners with identifying resources necessary to support technology-based economic development.
- o Assist Mississippi manufacturers in implementing workplace modernization solutions.
- o Foster Bio-based and renewable energy commercialization opportunities in Mississippi.
- o Communicate the message of innovation and the value of Innovate Mississippi to stakeholders. Innovate Mississippi's Goals, although adjusted annually to reflect market needs, are based on the long-term goals established in the legislatively formed and endorsed Mississippi Science & Technology Action Plan.

(D) Entrepreneurial Developmen:

This involves direct coaching and connecting work with Mississippi entrepreneurs and is traditionally the largest value-add of Innovate Mississippi toward creating jobs from the state's entrepreneurial ventures. This department works with 100 - 125 new entrepreneurial ventures and is responsible for all of the entrepreneurial related events, including Startup Weekends, the Mississippi New Venture Challenge, and the Company and Investor Spotlight. This department utilizes our propriety tools we developed with our former President. (Venture Capital Tools: www.VentureCapitalTools.com)

Each new company is taken through development in 5 risk areas: Product/Technology, Market, Finance, Management, & Execution. Companies leave this process with either an executable business plan or a decision to not

pursue their venture. (Both of which are valuable.) Companies needing capital and fitting the model for investor-ready deals are then handled by the Capital Formation Department.

This area is currently understaffed with 1 manager and 1 intern vs. the traditional staffing level of 1 manager, 1 analyst and 2 interns. Funding requested is to restore staffing to the traditional level.

(E) Capital Formation:

Capital formation consists of both the Angel Investor Network and the Mississippi Seed Fund. Both programs involve securing capital for Mississippi companies that need capital in order to grow successfully. Time and time again it's been shown that the good companies will get the capital, but if they get it in Austin, Atlanta or even New Orleans, they move there and grow up there instead of Mississippi.

The Angel Investor Network is a network of nearly 200 angel investors around the state that have interest in hearing about and hearing pitches from Mississippi startups. Meetings are held regionally - currently in Oxford, Tupelo, Jackson, and the Gulf Coast. Companies are rigorously screened and developed to participate in the Angel Investor Network - with only 8 or 10 actually pitching to investors out of approximately 125 companies that work with Entrepreneurial Development. Besides getting the companies ready to pitch, there is significant work in developing and maintaining the network in order to have it ready for the quarterly road-show pitch sessions.

The Mississippi Seed Fund is a program passed by the Legislature in 2007 that Innovate Mississippi manages with MDA acting as the bank. It can provide up to \$100,000 in convertible notes to companies - with several programs focused on earlier-stage or University research programs.

A small amount of restored funding is needed to provide intern support for Capital Formation. Under previous budgets, an intern position was funded, but the current budget does not allow for an intern and the quality of work is suffering. Travel has also been curtailed to the detriment of this state-wide program. A small increase in funding will have a large impact on investment dollars and ultimately on job creation.

(F) Manufacturing and Existing:

Innovate Mississippi is the host for InnovateMEP.ms - one of 60 nationwide Manufacturing Extension Partnership Centers through the Department of Commerce. This program is primarily federally funded but with a 2/3 match for every 1/3 federal. Innovate Mississippi provides some of the match, but the bulk of the match comes from fees charged to manufacturing clients and from InnovateMEP Centers at MSU CAVS Extension, the Mississippi Polymer Institute at USM, Itawamba Community College, Gulf Coast Community College, and a consortium of other community colleges in North Mississippi. Each company served through InnovateMEP is surveyed and the job creation, increased sales, and increased investment "directly as a result of the work of InnovateMEP" is tracked each quarter.

Innovate Mississippi's FY2015 budget that was cut from \$1.3 million to 1.0 million occurred at the same time that the Department of Commerce made available an extra \$100,000, so although that increased the match requirement, Innovate Mississippi was able to use this one-time federal money to fill in the gap created by the FY2015 budget cut. Part of the FY2016 increase will cover the required match and required state contribution for this program.

(G) Innovation Deployment:

This program spun out of Innovate Mississippi's InnovateMEP Division when opportunities were identified that could create significant value from "connecting the dots" between innovation centers - like universities, federal labs & inventors - and Mississippi companies who can take their products to market. Early success stories included The Perfect Bacon Bowl - resulting in a Port Gibson manufacturer adding 80 employees and the successful connection of several Mississippi companies to contracting opportunities related to licensing technology from the Army Engineering Research Development Center in Vicksburg.

Funded through the state in the FY2014 budget, the early successes of this program were used to attract 1-time funding from the Appalachian Regional Authority that covered the shortfall from the FY2015 budget. This ARC funding will run out at the beginning of FY2016, hence the need for a restoration of an overall \$1.5M for FY2016.

(H) Make it in America Reshori:

This program is another spin-out of InnovateMEP and focuses on assisting Mississippi companies in taking advantage of "reshoring" opportunities and bringing manufacturing back to the United States. This program also has substantial activity around trying to get large national retailers and other organizations to source content locally and regionally. Wal-mart has been engaged as a partner in this effort and is providing assistance for Mississippi

companies in walking through their supplier development process. This effort is also part of a larger effort nationwide that and is being coordinated in Mississippi in conjunction with a grant that Mississippi State received. This program is fully federally funded through FY2016 and does not require any state funding.

(I) Cleantech Programs:

Innovate Mississippi's "Clean-Tech" programs are focused on efficient and innovative cost effective energy deployment in Mississippi businesses. Cleantech programs include 3 programs: MEP Energy, Economy, & Environment (E3), Combined Heath & Power (CHP), and Strategic Biomass Solutions. These programs have developed from federal grants and from contracts with both Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality and MDA. Work in these cleantech programs is generally one of the most cost-effective manners to increase productivity and reduce cost in existing Mississippi businesses. In addition, the deployment of new technologies in this sector has resulted in the creation of many new jobs through companies like Elevance (Natchez) and Stion (Hattiesburg) This activity has been supported from grants from the US Department of Energy and from contracts with the MS Department of Environmental Quality and MDA. These grants and contracts are ending, so a slight increase in state funding is requested for FY2016. Although private sponsorships of these activities are being pursued - primarily from utilities, the focus of this effort may be beyond their capabilities since energy efficiency is only a small part of the savings.

Program Narrative for FY 2016

Innovate Mississippi is a non-profit, public-private partnership formed to meet the recommendations of the legislatively endorsed State Science and Technology Action Plan. This plan outlined a responsive private-sector non-profit whose Board of Directors is comprised of leadership from the private, academic and public sectors in Mississippi. The primary mission of Innovate Mississippi is to drive innovation and technology-based economic development efforts throughout the state, with the end goal of facilitating wealth creation through higher paying, quality jobs. Innovate Mississippi continues to focus on creating wealth by leveraging the state's research capacity and supporting technology business development for Mississippi companies.

All of our efforts are led through programs focusing on both start-ups and existing industry innovation. Mississippi is home to a growing number of world-class technology and science assets which are unique to our region. These assets include the Mississippi Polymer Institute at the University of Southern Mississippi, the Engineering Research Center and Life Sciences and Biotechnology Institute at Mississippi State University, the National Center for Physical Acoustics and the National Center for Natural Products at the University of Mississippi, the High Performance Visualization and Computing Center at Jackson State University, the University of Mississippi Medical Center, the NASA John C. Stennis Space Center, the Army Corps of Engineers Research and Development center, the U.S. Department of Agriculture Research facility in Stoneville and the Sustainable Energy Center at Mississippi State University.

In addition to these world class research assets, Mississippi has a vibrant number of start-up, emerging growth, and expansion stage companies throughout the state engaged in a wide variety of science and technology-based business sectors: computer software and hardware, network equipment, medical devices, pharmaceuticals and biotech, plastics and polymers, engineering, semiconductors, precision agriculture, bioenergy, and many others. This reflects the desire of many Mississippians to create their own opportunities and experience growth within the state. This program of work is carried out in cooperation and partnership with state agencies and institutions, local economic development organizations, private businesses, and government and academic leaders. Program Description

MISSION:

The primary mission of Innovate Mississippi is to drive innovation and technology-based economic development efforts throughout the state, with the end goal of facilitating wealth creation through higher paying, quality jobs. As the state's only group that assists companies in securing early-stage private equity, Innovate Mississippi works closely with others (mostly SBDC & MDA) to seamlessly refer companies who fit each group's unique focus. Innovate Mississippi also focuses on converting the state's research capacity into Mississippi companies. Performance Effectiveness Methodology & Review for Programs

Each Innovate Mississippi program offer specialized services to achieve Innovate Mississippi's mission to drive innovation and technology-based economic development for the State of Mississippi.

The Goals for Innovate Mississippi and for each Program are derived from the 1998 Science and Technology Action Plan and reviewed periodically by the Innovate Mississippi Board of Directors. Such reviews occurred in June 2007 and in July 2009. In the long-term, each project of Innovate Mississippi has overall project goals and measurement criteria as shown below. In addition, annual metrics are determined for each project based on the overall goals. These are updated and reviewed each quarter with the Innovate Mississippi Board of Directors. The performance measures are listed in the Program Performance Indicators and Measures section of our LBO submittal. In addition to monitoring performance to these objectives, the company-wide goals are then divided into department and even employee-specific goals. These individual goals then determine the daily tasks for each employee and the performance criteria upon which they are measured. In this way, each of the employee's daily tasks has a direct, clear link to those of the company.

Program Objectives

Innovate Mississippi's Mission and Objectives are realized through the implementation of the following long-term goals:

o Assist companies - especially early-stage innovation entrepreneurs by helping them plan and grow their businesses.

- o Connect investors and investment capital with early-stage companies.
- o Assist Mississippi manufacturers in implementing workplace modernization solutions.
- o Foster CleanTech commercialization and deployment opportunities in Mississippi.
- o Communicate the message of innovation and the value of Innovate Mississippi to stakeholders. Innovate Mississippi's Goals, although adjusted annually to reflect market needs, are based on the long-term goals established in the legislatively formed and endorsed Mississippi Science & Technology Action Plan.

Programs and FY2016 Budget Justification

1. Entrepreneurial Development

This involves direct coaching and connecting work with Mississippi entrepreneurs and is traditionally the largest value-add of Innovate Mississippi toward creating jobs from the state's entrepreneurial ventures. This department works with 100 - 125 new entrepreneurial ventures and is responsible for all of the entrepreneurial related events, including Startup Weekends, the Mississippi New Venture Challenge, and the Company and Investor Spotlight. This department utilizes our propriety tools we developed with our former President. (Venture Capital Tools: www.VentureCapitalTools.com)

Each new company is taken through development in 5 risk areas: Product/Technology, Market, Finance, Management, & Execution. Companies leave this process with either an executable business plan or a decision to not pursue their venture. (Both of which are valuable.) Companies needing capital and fitting the model for investor-ready deals are then handled by the Capital Formation Department.

This area is currently understaffed with 1 manager and 1 intern vs. the traditional staffing level of 1 manager, 1 analyst and 2 interns. Funding requested is to restore staffing to the traditional level.

2. Capital Formation

Capital formation consists of both the Angel Investor Network and the Mississippi Seed Fund. Both programs involve securing capital for Mississippi companies that need capital in order to grow successfully. Time and time again it's been shown that the good companies will get the capital, but if they get it in Austin, Atlanta or even New Orleans, they move there and grow up there instead of Mississippi.

The Angel Investor Network is a network of nearly 200 angel investors around the state that have interest in hearing about and hearing pitches from Mississippi startups. Meetings are held regionally - currently in Oxford, Tupelo, Jackson, and the Gulf Coast. Companies are rigorously screened and developed to participate in the Angel Investor Network - with only 8 or 10 actually pitching to investors out of approximately 125 companies that work with Entrepreneurial Development. Besides getting the companies ready to pitch, there is significant work in developing and maintaining the network in order to have it ready for the quarterly road-show pitch sessions.

The Mississippi Seed Fund is a program passed by the Legislature in 2007 that Innovate Mississippi manages with MDA acting as the bank. It can provide up to \$100,000 in convertible notes to companies - with several programs focused on earlier-stage or University research programs.

A small amount of restored funding is needed to provide intern support for Capital Formation. Under previous budgets, an intern position was funded, but the current budget does not allow for an intern and the quality of work is suffering. Travel has also been curtailed to the detriment of this state-wide program. A small increase in funding will have a large impact on investment dollars and ultimately on job creation.

3. Manufacturing and Existing Industry Innovation

Innovate Mississippi is the host for InnovateMEP.ms - one of 60 nationwide Manufacturing Extension Partnership Centers through the Department of Commerce. This program is primarily federally funded but with a 2/3 match for every 1/3 federal. Innovate Mississippi provides some of the match, but the bulk of the match comes from fees charged to manufacturing clients and from InnovateMEP Centers at MSU CAVS Extension, the Mississippi Polymer Institute at USM, Itawamba Community College, Gulf Coast Community College, and a consortium of other community colleges in North Mississippi. Each company served through InnovateMEP is surveyed and the job creation, increased sales, and increased investment "directly as a result of the work of InnovateMEP" is tracked each quarter.

Innovate Mississippi's FY2015 budget that was cut from \$1.3 million to 1.0 million occurred at the same time that

the Department of Commerce made available an extra \$100,000, so although that increased the match requirement, Innovate Mississippi was able to use this one-time federal money to fill in the gap created by the FY2015 budget cut. Part of the FY2016 increase will cover the required match and required state contribution for this program.

4. Innovation Deployment

This program spun out of Innovate Mississippi's InnovateMEP Division when opportunities were identified that could create significant value from "connecting the dots" between innovation centers - like universities, federal labs & inventors - and Mississippi companies who can take their products to market. Early success stories included The Perfect Bacon Bowl - resulting in a Port Gibson manufacturer adding 80 employees and the successful connection of several Mississippi companies to contracting opportunities related to licensing technology from the Army Engineering Research Development Center in Vicksburg.

Funded through the state in the FY2014 budget, the early successes of this program were used to attract 1-time funding from the Appalachian Regional Authority that covered the shortfall from the FY2015 budget. This ARC funding will run out at the beginning of FY2016, hence the need for a restoration of an overall \$1.5M for FY2016.

5. Make it in America Reshoring Initiative

This program is another spin-out of InnovateMEP and focuses on assisting Mississippi companies in taking advantage of "reshoring" opportunities and bringing manufacturing back to the United States. This program also has substantial activity around trying to get large national retailers and other organizations to source content locally and regionally. Wal-mart has been engaged as a partner in this effort and is providing assistance for Mississippi companies in walking through their supplier development process. This effort is also part of a larger effort nationwide that and is being coordinated in Mississippi in conjunction with a grant that Mississippi State received. This program is fully federally funded through FY2016 and does not require any state funding.

6. Cleantech Programs - including E3, CHP, & SBS

Innovate Mississippi's "Clean-Tech" programs are focused on efficient and innovative cost effective energy deployment in Mississippi businesses. Cleantech programs include 3 programs: MEP Energy, Economy, & Environment (E3), Combined Heath & Power (CHP), and Strategic Biomass Solutions. These programs have developed from federal grants and from contracts with both Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality and MDA. Work in these cleantech programs is generally one of the most cost-effective manners to increase productivity and reduce cost in existing Mississippi businesses. In addition, the deployment of new technologies in this sector has resulted in the creation of many new jobs through companies like Elevance (Natchez) and Stion (Hattiesburg) This activity has been supported from grants from the US Department of Energy and from contracts with the MS Department of Environmental Quality and MDA. These grants and contracts are ending, so a slight increase in state funding is requested for FY2016. Although private sponsorships of these activities are being pursued - primarily from utilities, the focus of this effort may be beyond their capabilities since energy efficiency is only a small part of the savings.
